This one hits particularly close to home, with one out of five Alameda County residents benefiting from their services.

In the future, if you want to contribute to a food bank on your own, please remember that while canned food drives look good, especially around Thanksgiving and Christmas, *what they really want is money.*



By being able to buy directly from the growers and producers and partnering with other for banks in the region, *they can take your dollar and get about six dollars' worth of food.*

Meet the Beneficiaries

Bay Area Youth Center

BAYC provides support and a safe space for at-risk youth who identify as LGBT and may be at risk for homelessness, drug or alcohol abuse, physical or emotional abuse. It provides service to youth in the East Bay/ Hayward area.

Alameda County Community Food Bank

Alameda County Community Food Bank has been in business since 1985 ... with a vision toward a day when they can go out of business. ACCFB is the hub of a vast collection and distribution network that provides food for 240 nonprofit agencies in Alameda County.

In 2015, the Food Bank distributed 25 million meals -- more than half of the food was fresh fruits and vegetables. Our goal is to ensure every food insecure child, adult and senior in Alameda County knows where their next meal is coming from, by 2018.

Through a network of 240 strategically placed member agencies - food pantries, soup kitchens, child-care centers, senior centers, after-school programs and other community-based organizations - as well as their own direct-distribution programs, the Food Bank distributes enough food to provide 540,000 meals weekly.

Their systematic approach to alleviating hunger includes:

- One of California's busiest – and most efficient – emergency food helplines
- A multilingual outreach effort which serves as the blueprint for pro-grams across the nation
- Dynamic hunger and nutrition education programs
- An innovative advocacy program that promotes policies to benefit low-income residents.
